























ANCIENT WOODLAND SECTION







PINEBANKS AND LANGLEY NORTH PRECEDENT IMAGES









Development at Pinebanks will include:

- Up to 295 new homes
- Access from Henby Way and Hillcrest Road as per previously implemented permission
- A landscape buffer zone between development and the ancient woodland
- New areas of open space

Development at Langley North will include:

- Up to 105 new homes
- Access via Pinebanks
- New hard and soft landscaping
- New and improved pedestrian and cyclist links
- Securing the long-term future of the WW2 'Zero' radio bunker and listed tower

- New and improved pedestrian and cyclist links


















GRIFFIN LANE AND YARMOUTH ROAD ELEVATIONS

Development at Griffin Lane will include:

- Up to 150 new homes
- Access via a new roundabout junction on Yarmouth Road
- Significant buffer between the development and the Broads
- Opportunities for new and improved pedestrian access to the Broads
- Preservation of the WW2 tank traps that formed part of the East Anglian Stop Line
- Enhancement of reed bed, providing public access with a dipping platform and a visitor car park


























PINEBANKS WOODLANDS

Protection:

The ancient and semi-natural woodland totals 3.8 ha. There will be no public access into the ancient woodland which will be protected by a combination of fencing and dense edge planting and natural re-generation.

Restoration:

A long-term woodland management plan has been prepared that will see the removal of nonnative flora, such as laurel and rhododendron, improving the woodland margins and protecting veteran trees.

Long-term management:

The woodland will be managed as a wildlife reserve in conjunction with local conservation bodies. This will include ancient and other woodland areas.









GRIFFIN LANE MARSH

Protection:

A sustainable drainage scheme for the area has been devised to filter surface water before it reaches the marsh. All trees will be retained along the edge of the marsh.

Connectivity:

A new footpath will be constructed along the edge of the marsh leading to a small pond and dipping platform. A small car park with interpretation boards will be constructed to serve as a base for exploration of both the Griffin Lane Marsh (by arrangement with Norfolk Wildlife Trust) and Thorpe Marshes.

Long-term management:

A long-term management plan has been prepared that will allow for the restoration and enlargement of the marsh. The area will be managed as a wildlife reserve in co-operation with local conservation bodies.

COMMUNITY BENEFITS

The proposals being brought forward for Pinebanks, Langley North, Langley South and Griffin Lane will deliver a range of community benefits, including:

- Up to 725 much needed and thoughtfully designed new homes, in a wide range of unit sizes.
- A mixture of high-quality affordable homes.
- Preservation of the ancient woodland by delivering a long term management plan.
- New cycle and pedestrian links throughout the site, as well as from homes to the north of the site to Yarmouth Road.
- Securing the long-term future of the WW2 'Zero' radio bunker, listed tower and tank traps.
- Enhancement of reed bed, providing public access with a car park and dipping platform at Griffin Lane.
- Replacement native species planting, regeneration of ancient semi-natural woodland and careful retention of other mature and veteran trees to substantially improve wildlife habitats.
- Local employment and training opportunities during construction.
- Improvement of local highway infrastructure.
